Health and Wellness Services Grounded In Land-based Healing

Imagine a space for land-based healing in Vancouver that supports a connected, empowered, and thriving urban Indigenous community.


Rooted in tradition, ceremony and ancestral knowledge, land-based healing creates community, fosters a sense of belonging, and connects us to something bigger. It's also what makes Vancouver Aboriginal Health Society (VAHS)—a leader in Indigenous health service for more than 30 years—different.

From Pipe Ceremonies held on the back porch of our clinic, to sweat lodges in the East Hastings community garden, and our daily cultural workshops on-site, VAHS consistently exercises its commitment to land-based healing. These critical health offerings are about to expand, thanks to the Housing and Healing Centre project at 52-92 East Hastings Street—a collaboration of the Aboriginal Land Trust, VAHS, Lu'ma Native Housing Society, and RainCity Housing. The building, which will provide 111 housing units, will also give VAHS a new purpose-built space.


Opening in Fall 2023, the new VAHS Healing Centre will provide ongoing land-based healing opportunities as well as culturally safe primary care, dental care, counselling, and social supports to urban Indigenous people in Vancouver. The new facility will bring our primary care, dental, and cultural programs under one roof for the first time, allowing for greater collaboration and further integration of land-based healing into our services.

The VAHS Healing Centre will honour and celebrate the xʷməθkʷəy̓əm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), and səliwətaʔ (Tsleil-Waututh) Nations—the people who first called this land home. The area now known as the Downtown Eastside is called Lek'Leki ("beautiful grove"), a crossroads for surrounding Skwxwú7mesh villages to meet, and a source of diverse foods and medicines.

The new ceremonial and garden spaces in the VAHS Healing Centre are an opportunity to connect people to the rich history of these lands. This new facility is an important step towards reconciliation.

What the VAHS Healing Centre will Offer

The VAHS Healing Centre will be an accessible, one-stop location for medical, dental, mental health, and social services. These key services will be enhanced by the Centre's cultural programming and the VAHS Circle of Care model that braids Indigenous knowledge and land-based healing into urban healthcare.

The new, purpose-built, three-storey VAHS Healing Centre will promote low-barrier opportunities for land-based healing for urban Indigenous people. An outdoor Healing Garden on the third floor will offer accessible and permanent ceremony space in the heart of the Downtown Eastside, including a sweat lodge, a water feature for water ceremonies, a teepee for healing circles, and a medicinal plant garden.

A traditional medicine pharmacy, connected to the Primary Care and Dental Clinics, will offer medicinal plants, salves, teas, and other plant extracts, providing access to medicines not readily available in the city. Elders and Knowledge Keepers will have spaces for workshops, ceremonies, counselling, and cultural sharing.

The first of its kind in Western Canada, this innovative facility will be a place of healing and growth grounded in First Nations, Inuit, and Métis ancestral knowledge.

Healing Centre Services at a Glance

Designed to welcome everyone with dignity, respect, honour, and love, the VAHS Healing Centre will offer a variety of services, including:

- A **Primary Care Clinic** that demonstrates respect and value for patients and is responsive to the unique needs of urban Indigenous people
- A full-service **Dental Clinic** with by-donation options for those without dental coverage, and a training facility that partners with local college/university Dental programs to promote culturally safe dental care
- An in-house **pharmacy** for traditional and Western medicines
- A **welcoming physical layout** that promotes holistic healing for all, including outdoor elements such as medicinal plants, a sweat lodge, a teepee, and a water feature
- **Mental and emotional support services** that help people feel accepted, safe, cared for, equal, and empowered
- **Trauma-informed counselling** for families and individuals
- **Cultural sharing and traditional healing**
